- A Message from the Founder



My passion and drive to make a difference in the lives of children who have survived the passing on of their mother because of maternal mortality is born out of my personal experience in 2014. After the delivery of my youngest daughter, I had severe postpartum hemorrhage that almost cost me my life. While in recovery after six hours of post-delivery surgery, it was clear to me that my life had been spared for a reason. My thoughts were confirmed by my doctor who said, “You are so lucky to be here to take care of your baby.” Those words resonated deeply with me. Not only was I thankful for being alive, but I also felt a strong burden to raise awareness about the effects of maternal mortality and to help children who were not so fortunate to have their mother survive their birth. Thus, HSF is my thanksgiving to God and my devotion to help these precious children.

Driven by a strong passion and determination to make a difference in children’s lives, the Health Support Foundation (HSF) was established to support children from birth to seven years who have lost their mothers during or immediately after delivery. The impact of maternal mortality on the affected child and the immediate family is far reaching - a permanent emotional and a physical vacuum caused by the absence of a mother; and the overall developmental progress of the child can be undermined without an adequate support system that meets these needs. HSF fills this vacuum. It aims to minimize the impact of maternal mortality on surviving children through targeted support that meets their educational, emotional and physical needs.

Unfortunately, although maternal mortality is a subject of much research in academia, surviving children are not often talked about, nor are there enough programs in countries to address their specific needs. With the support of our board members, donors and volunteers, HSF is determined to bridge this gap. Our enclosed Annual Impact Report for the years 2022 and 2021 portrays our performance in accomplishing our mission of supporting children between the age of zero to seven years old who have lost their mothers during childbirth to have a healthy, happy, and educated life.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude and appreciation to our partners, donors and volunteers for your support in 2021 and 2022. Without your support, none of the above accomplishments would have been possible and, most importantly, the beneficiaries would have been worse off. In 2023, we will count on your continued support for HSF to continue being a mother to the motherless.

OUR MISSION

The Health Support Foundation (HSF) aims to reduce the economic and social burden of maternal mortality on surviving children from ages Zero to Seven years by providing financial, in-kind donation, and counseling support to the affected families that need such assistance.

Our Services:

HSF Core program services areas are as follows:

HSF is operational in Ghana and Liberia. It has started operations in Kenya in 2023. HSF provides support to children and their families consisting of cash grants and in-kind donations, depending on the needs identified. HSF has targeted five main areas to support the children, at three essential age stages from birth to 7 years old:

- Cuddle a Baby - From birth to 1 year old
- Stimulate a Toddler - From 2 to 4 years old
- Nurture a School Child - From 5 to 7 years old

At each of these three age stages, HSF provides services and support covering five main areas.

- Nutrition, consisting of food supplements and baby formula at the Baby age stage
- Education, relevant to the Toddler and Child stages, incorporating school tuition and lunch, uniforms and schools supplies, transportation from home to school
- Healthcare and Wellness, including regular health check-ups, medical treatment when needed, medicines and multivitamins, and nutrition education and counseling services for the child and her family members or guardians
- Personal Effects such as clothing and shoes, but also personal hygiene effects and diapers for the Babies
- Social Activities, mainly birthday celebrations

Other targeted relief support:

In addition to active management of the Zero to Seven year-olds support program, we collaborate with relevant NGOs to provide ad hoc support and relief to people in need in selected low-income communities. Over the past two years we supported actions in Ghana and Thailand.



Targeted Relief Highlight: Thailand 2021-2022

In partnership with local NGOs, we provided targeted relief support to the local community around Bangkok and Nonthaburi. During 2021, in response to the challenges some low-income families living in slums were facing during the COVID-19 pandemic, HSF donated rice, oil, beans and canned fish to the families. HSF has also made financial donations to support orphanages during the pandemic. The COVID support was about \$6,000.

In December 2022, we were delighted to have the opportunity to visit Pakkred Babies' Home Orphanage in Nonthaburi Province, and to present 5,000 suction catheters and care packages worth \$5,000 to the children.

HSF's Impact Stories

At HSF, we are passionate about making a positive impact on the lives of children who are victims of maternal mortality. Here are some of the stories of children who have benefited from our support.



Emmanuel, Eunice, and Emmanuella's Story

Enrollment: 2016 - Present

Triplets Emmanuel, Eunice, and Emmanuella lost their mother after she gave birth to them, leaving their father to single handedly care for them. He found it challenging to provide for them, given the significant financial burden.

HSF provided monthly remittance for payment of in-home nanny and baby formula during the first eight months, and subsequently, food supplements.

The foundation has also been supporting the children by paying for their school fees, transportation, and feeding costs.

All three children now attend Startrite Montessori School in Accra Ghana, thanks to HSF's support.



Priscila and Princess' Story

Enrollment: 2017 - Present

When Priscila and Princess' mother, Stella, passed away due to complications resulting from surgery, their retired grandparents stepped in to care for them. However, providing for the twins was challenging, given their limited resources.

HSF provided much-needed assistance by supplying baby formula and diapers, which helped alleviate the family's financial burden.

The twin girls are now enrolled in school and love it.



Favor's Story

Enrollment: 2017 - Present

Favor joined the HSF family when she was just three years old. Initially, she was shy and quiet, but over time, she has blossomed into a social butterfly.

Favor is now in fourth grade and dreams of becoming a singer one day.

HSF is committed to supporting her to reach her full potential.



Gabriel and Godfrey's Story

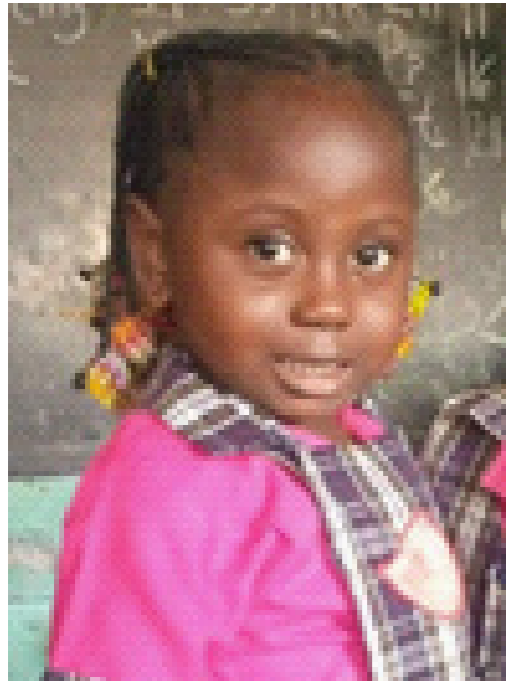
Enrollment: 2018 - Present

Gabriel and Godfrey lost their mother to respiratory distress and aspiration pneumonia when they were only three days old. Their aunt, Tene, has been their caregiver since then.

Tene has found it challenging to provide for the twins with her limited resources.

HSF has provided critical support to the family by paying for the elementary education expenses and helping with food supplies consistently to care for the children.

Tene expressed her gratitude to HSF for their assistance and hopes that the foundation will continue to support the children as they grow.



Elise's Story

Enrollment: 2018 - Present

When Elise's mother died just six days after giving birth, her grandmother, Mrs. Helena, took on the responsibility of caring for the newborn. However, she found it difficult to provide for Elise, given the financial situation in Liberia.

HSF was able to provide regular baby formula, clothing, and medication assistance to Elise, which has been critical in helping to care for the baby.

Elise's grandmother has expressed her gratitude to HSF for its support and is hopeful that the foundation can continue to do more to help Elise and children like her.

Brief Report from Liberia and Ghana

Brief Report from Liberia

In line with the vision that gave birth to Health Support Foundation (HSF) - bringing back hope to the motherless children, to support and care for the under-privileged was a passion I had been nurturing over the years. When I came into contact with HSF, I knew I could identify myself with this organization by contributing my quota to the organization while still fulfilling my passion. These have been my reasons for joining the Health Support Foundation.

Giving great hope and assurance to the children, that a better future is certain and the opportunity for success won't fade is one of the things that fulfills my life. My routine contact with these kids through visitation and monitoring has been key to making sure that the kids get their supplies and needs on time so far as the supplies are available. My constant presence in their lives has been their comfort and strength. HSF keeps the children fed while they attend school, and this has reduced the financial and economic burden previously shouldered by their caretakers who are often financially stressed.

Despite the success achieved with the children we cater for we still require more support to do more. The level of funds required to meet our planned target is usually not met, hence, we are forced to cut back on our plans. I believe with adequate support from donors, well-meaning Liberians, and the world at large, we will be able to achieve more.

Brief Report from Ghana

The Health Support Foundation (HSF) currently has nineteen (19) children enrolled in Ghana – nine girls (9) and ten boys (10). The children are in Accra, Ho, Akosombo and Wassa Akropong in Ghana.

For about five years now, HSF's main areas of support to children and their families include counseling services, access to medical care, and monthly provision of food items, diapers, clothing, nanny care and educational grants. Occasionally, social events are also organized for the children when the need arises. HSF is contributing to the physical and psychological development and the well-being of its beneficiaries. As a trained social worker, I have always sought an opportunity to support the care and protection of vulnerable and children in need around me. Therefore, it is not surprising that I have devoted time and energy towards the well-being of the children in HSF's program in Ghana. I wholeheartedly believe in HSF's philosophy that to mitigate the negative impact of maternal mortality on children, the best place to raise a child is a home setting where they receive care and emotional support from close family members.

The Impact

HSF has made a huge difference in the lives of the children in the program in Ghana. The range of support has helped to boost the self-esteem of the children and families involved. Unfortunately, in some parts of Ghana, children who have survived their mother during childbirth suffer social stigma, which may include being blamed by close relatives and the society for their mother's death. HSF has helped to raise awareness about the causes of maternal mortality, and through in-kind and financial support, the children in the program are safeguarded from such stigmatization.

Also, the act of helping the less privileged has inspired other close relatives of the affected children to repeat such acts of kindness, after observing that an organization that is not affiliated with the child is helping. HSF's support is having a positive ripple effect throughout the communities the children live in and this is encouraging to see. All the families receiving support have expressed deep appreciation and thanks to HSF for the support provided.

Challenges and Future Plans

Access to remote areas where some of the beneficiaries live is often a challenge due to poor road conditions, especially during the rainy season. Apart from the monthly distribution of support, monitoring the progress of the children within those months becomes difficult. To remediate some of these challenges, the objective is to have access to reliable means of transportation such as a motorcycle through local partnerships and support from donors. This will greatly help with identification, implementation, evaluation and monitoring of program activities on a daily basis.

Furthermore, training HSF's staff to higher and more adequate levels of computer literacy will help to improve data collection and analysis to keep track of activities, increase efficiency and facilitate reporting.

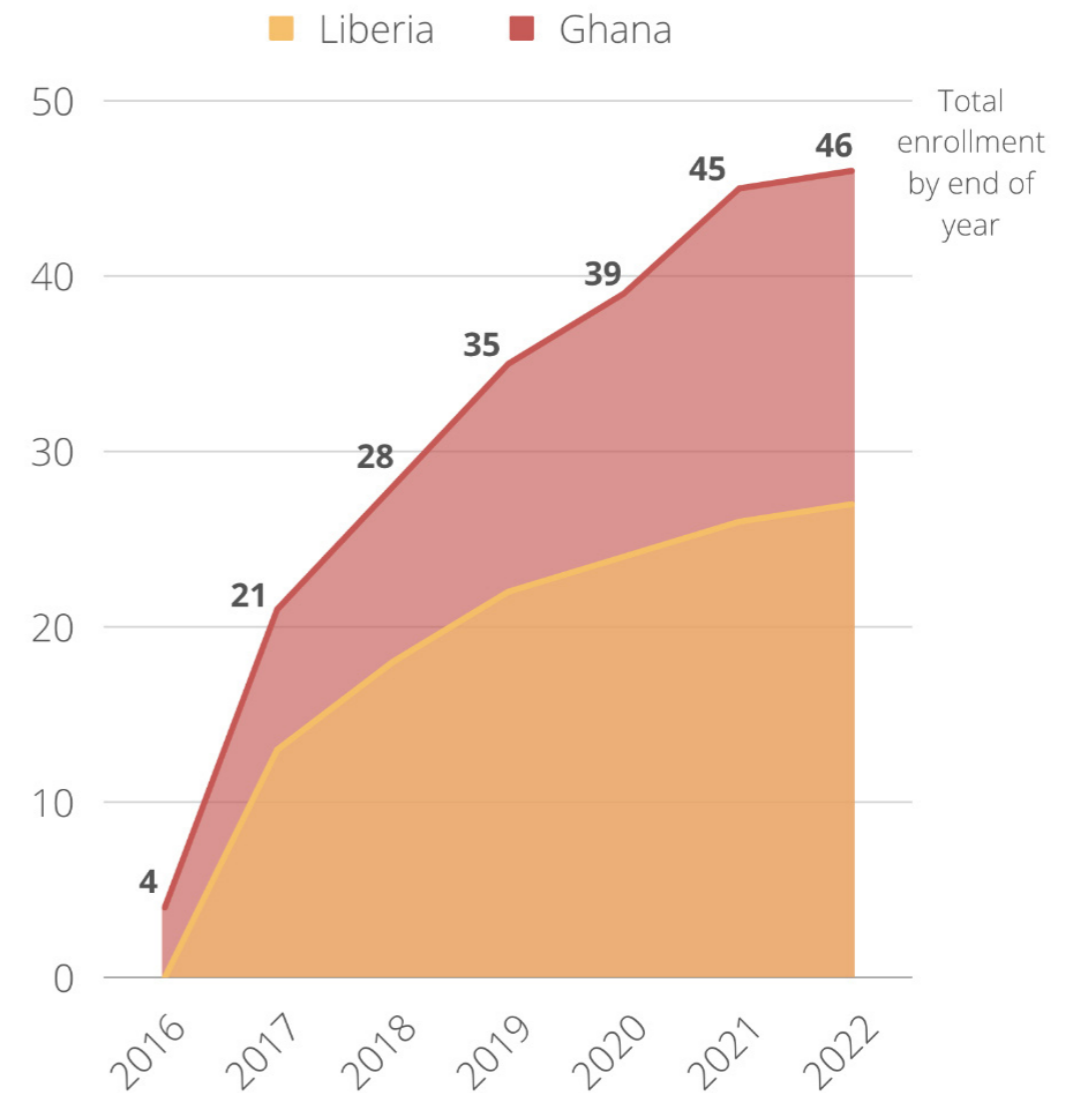


Figure 1. Cumulative enrollment of children in HSF’s programs in Liberia and Ghana by year, 2016 – 2022

As of December 31, 2022, there were 27 children enrolled in the program in Liberia and 19 in Ghana. As illustrated in Figure 1, enrollment has been growing steadily over the years, with the areas for both countries showing an upward trend. This growth in enrollment highlights the impact of HSF’s programs in providing education and support for children in these countries.

Our team has worked to ensure that our programs are effective, efficient, and meet the needs of the beneficiaries we serve. We have continuously monitored and evaluated our programs to identify areas for improvement and, as a result, we have made significant strides in improving the quality of our work over our years of operation. Our dedication to quality has earned us the trust and respect of the communities we serve, and we remain committed to delivering the best possible services to them. With our continued efforts to expand our services in both current and new countries, we anticipate a continuous increase in child enrollment in the coming years.



Kenya

BREAKING THE CYCLE OF MATERNAL MORTALITY

HSF's Impact-Driven Support for Surviving Children

The impact of maternal mortality on families and communities is devastating, with long-standing effects that go beyond the loss of a mother. This crisis extends beyond the individual to impact families, communities, and nations worldwide. Despite a steady and continuing decline of maternal deaths due to complications in pregnancy and childbirth over the past two decades (34%), the World Health Organization (WHO) reported 800 maternal deaths daily worldwide in 2020 – a maternal mortality ratio (MMR) of 223 deaths per 100,000 live births. Sub-Saharan African countries alone account for 72% of these deaths, an indication of the stark inequality in access to adequate healthcare services. The WHO highlights this disparity by reporting MMR of 536 in Sub-Saharan Africa, compared with only 13 in Europe and Central Asia.

The global burden of maternal mortality is further highlighted in a journal article titled, “The true cost of maternal death: individual tragedy impacts family, community and nations,” by Suellen Miller and José M Belizan. According to this research, maternal mortality is a significant contributor to global health inequity, with ripple effects of a mother’s loss that include increased risks of infant mortality, limited access to education and economic opportunities, and reduced productivity and economic growth. Moreover, maternal mortality has far-reaching implications for communities, as the loss of women’s contributions to their families and societies can have significant long-term consequences.

At HSF, our mission is to ease the burden of the victims of this global crisis by providing holistic care and support to children and families affected by maternal mortality. While the issue of maternal mortality requires global attention, our current efforts and services have been targeted to two countries within the Sub-Saharan African region, Liberia and Ghana. In 2023, HSF will officially start its operations in Kenya where two children have already been enrolled in the program, which will continue to expand over time. In contrast with the trend in the region, MMR has been increasing in Kenya in recent years.

Our services address areas such as nutrition, healthcare, educational support, wellness, and preventive counseling for children at risk and their guardians and family members. Through these, we strive to minimize the impact on surviving children through targeted support to fulfill their emotional, physical, and financial needs.

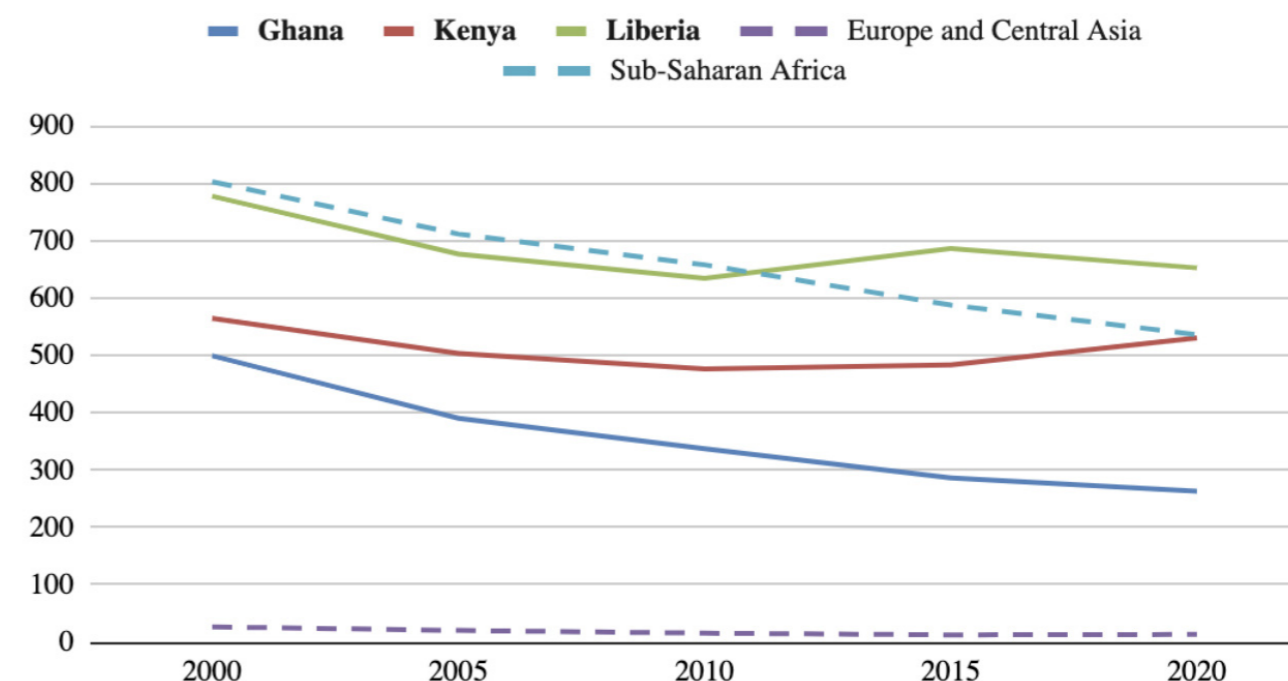


Figure 2. Incidence of MMR in countries supported by HSF - 2000 to 2020. Source: Trends in maternal mortality 2000 to 2020 - Estimates by WHO, UNICEF, UNFPA, World Bank Group and UNDESA/Population Division.

Despite the economic challenges brought about by COVID-19, which have made fundraising and carrying out of programs difficult, we have achieved progressive organic growth. Our unwavering dedication to this cause is evident in the Statement of Activities section, which serves as a testament to our resilience, commitment, and impact.

What sets us apart is our firm commitment to tackling the needs of kids who survived maternal mortality by reinvesting all earnings generated into the cause. We have utilized every opportunity, no matter how small, to make a difference in the lives of the children we support. It is our pleasure to share our accomplishments with you and we remain steadfast in our pursuit to minimize the social, psychological, and economic effects of maternal mortality.

Looking ahead, we are exploring opportunities to expand our sources of cash flow. We recognize the need for financial sustainability and the importance of diversifying our revenue streams. We are exploring new partnerships and fundraising opportunities with the private sector, government agencies, and other nonprofits to increase our funding base. We believe that this initiative will not only improve our financial sustainability but also enable us to expand our programs and reach more children, families, and communities in need.

100% of net revenues are used towards HSF Core Program and Targeted relief activities. No fees paid to any individual or group.

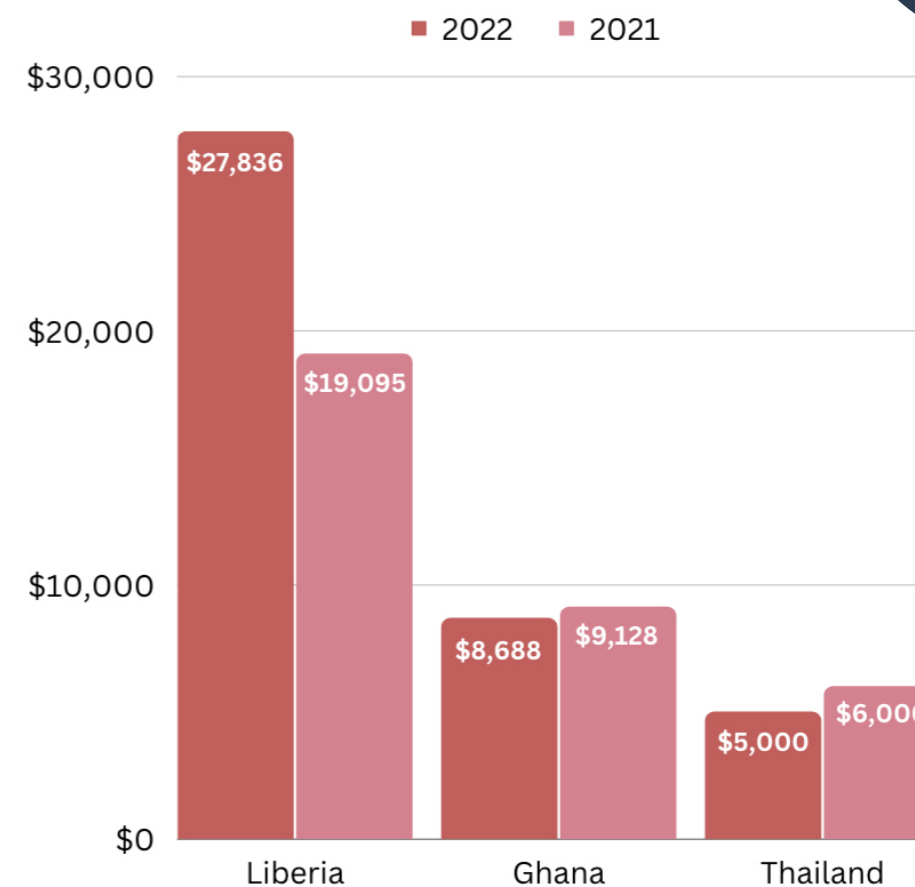


Figure 4. Distribution of Expenses across HSF's service countries for 2021 and 2022

LOOKING FORWARD

HSF is committed to growing its scale of operations in upcoming years. While we are ambitious for the future, it is important we reflect on the past and share a few progress areas as well as some challenges experienced these past two years, as well as provide an outlook for next year.

- We continue our successful operations in Ghana and Liberia, and are at the initial stages of enrolling children in Kenya as additional service country in 2023.
- We provided and continue to provide in-kind and financial support to 46 children in Ghana and Liberia, making it possible for the beneficiaries to have access to basic baby formula, supplemental food supplies, clothes, daycare, and to attend pre-school to attain early elementary school education.
- Our Board of Directors is constituted, and our management team is operational, providing a solid basis for our future expansion.
- We have undergone an independent financial review for 2021/2022 years of operation and received a clean opinion. Those years were, however, not without challenges. Despite receiving numerous requests for support, we were unable to accommodate additional children beyond a limit of 46 due to funding constraints.
- We are committed to a sustainable funding model that requires us not to overcommit financially. At the same time, it was difficult to turn away so many eligible children and their families who very much needed our support.

In the coming year, we will continue to focus on providing support for the children in Ghana and Liberia, finalize our operational expansion plans in Kenya and explore opportunities to expand in other sub-Saharan African countries.

The demand for our services continues to grow and requires us to raise additional funding to continue our support to enrolled children in our program and to expand. We have laid a solid foundation for growth having put in place the necessary governance framework, operationalized our business model in two countries and initiated work in another, and undergone an independent review of financial reporting process. We are ready to scale up our operations and support many more potentially qualified children in multiple other countries. The future is daunting, but the prospects are bright. We will continue to learn from our current operations and continue to improve our business model.

C. Phase II Funding

Our next stage of growth is to implement a plan for children ages 7 and up who are released from HSF's current 0-7 years program. To mitigate the risks of drop out for surviving children being educated, we aim to provide educational support through elementary school.

We plan to offer the following services under HSF's Phase II program - Child education for a Brighter Future.

- Advocating and implementing structures to enhance formal education, bringing to spotlight the importance of basic education and the economic benefit to families and the country;
- Sponsoring education feeding child in school to reduce the financial burden and overall increase in school enrolment;
- Sponsoring education expenses to reduce the financial burden and overall increase in school enrolment;
- Scaling up our prevention education and advocacy to address the causes of maternal mortality in vulnerable communities;

(Phase II Funding)

- Providing resources for children to acquire the necessary skills and education to lead healthy, productive, independent, meaningful lives. Also, eradicating poverty as an educational benefit;
- Advocating against the negative prevailing social thought that discourages or minimizes the importance of education for children. Key emphases on the benefits of education which enables a child to develop their full potential and becoming productive in society; and
- Advocating for family involvement and learning programs to improve the quality of child education.

With this plan, financial sponsorship will be crucial to ensure that we are able to carry out this program effectively.
